With regular verbs the **simple past** is formed by just adding "ed" to the infinitive (basic form); with verbs ending with a final "e", just add a d. A final consonant after a short, stressed vowel is doubled.

We tested the new mobile. He showed me some photos.

She lived in Manchester. They liked the hotel.

We swapped places. I spotted my friend.

Ouestions in the simple past are formed with did (simple past form of do), the verb remains in the present form. Negations are formed with didn't (short form of did not) + infinitive.

What did you like?
When did he arrive?
Where did they play?
Did you like the cake?
Did he arrive today?
Did they play outside?

Yes, I did. / No, I didn't. Yes, he did. / No, he didn't. Yes, they did. / No, they didn't.

The **past progressive** is used when we talk about an action that was in progress at a specific time in the past. We use a **form of to be** (was or were), the **infinitive of the verb** and the **ending-ing**.

Yesterday at 3 o'clock, I was doing my homework.

The past progressive often also desribes a background story that was in progress when another action began. The second action is in the simple past:

He was waiting for the bus when it started to rain.
They were watching TV when their parents came home.
